

THE MISTAKE NOT TO MAKESEEING IT ALL IN ONE TRIP!

In the later part of the 18th century, the delightful riverside settlement of Gabrielino Indians, Franciscan priests and Spanish adventurers was named El Pueblo Nustra Senora la Reina de Los Angeles de Porciuncula, or Los Angeles, for short. It has changed a lot. A concrete tsunami spread out in all directions from that original 1781 domicile, eventually fusing into an indistinguishable tangle of towns that stretches for 100 miles in almost all directions. It's now the home to more than 21 million people from 140 countries, speaking 224 languages. The original name for this slice of civilization has been shortened over its 200-plus years to just two letters that are now instantly recognized anywhere on Earth—L.A.

It's also a town that celebrates aviation. Los Angeles is the place where America saw its first air show, where Amelia Earhart took her first airplane ride, where Donald Douglas birthed what many hail as the most important airliner in aviation history—the DC-3—and where a little-known pilot named Charles Lindbergh initiated the first passenger service from Southern California to New York. It is also the town where Humphrey Bogart stood on a Hollywood set on the local Van Nuys, Calif., airport tarmac and reminded a teary-eyed Ingrid Bergman that they'd always have Paris.

And, of course, Los Angeles is much more than aviation. L.A. is where Dorothy followed the Yellow Brick Road, and where the second tragedy of the Kennedy Curse came to the kitchen floor of the Ambassador Hotel. It is the epicenter of casual fashion, entertainment, surfing and sunshine. Some of the world's most famous neighborhoods are here, including Beverly Hills, and another which still announces its hillside presence with 30-foot letters, H-O-L-L-Y-W-O-O-D...

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Compared to other famous cityscapes like New York, the Los Angeles skylight (above) illustrates the comparatively open feeling that carries through much of this Southern California metroplex. LA is also custom made for pilots. You can park your airplane at the front door of Santa Monica's Typhoon Restaurant (below).

But it was ground zero, starting in 1943—when Kelly Johnson began a legacy of aircraft development that stretches from America's first jet fighter, the P-80 Shooting Star, to the highest performing aircraft the world has even known, the SR-71 Blackbird.

Not surprisingly, L.A. is the incubator of one of the world's most lucrative and ubiquitous culinary phenomenon—fast food. This is the mother ship. Los Angeles was ground zero for thousands of fast-food fundamentals, the most famous of which include:

1926 - Orange Julius, Julius Freed, Los Angeles

1941 - Carl's Hot Dog Stand (Carl's Jr.), Carl Karcher, Los Angeles

1948 - In-N-Out, Harry Snyder, Baldwin Park, Calif.

1948 - Winchell's Donuts, Verne Winchell, Temple City, Calif.

1952 - Fatburger, Lovie Yancey, Los Angeles

1953 - Danny's Donuts (Denny's Restaurants), Harold Butler, Lakewood, Calif.

1958 - IHOP, Al Lapin, Toluca Lake, Calif.

1958 - Sizzler, Culver City, Calif.

1962 - Taco Bell, Glen Bell, Downey, Calif.

Consequently, you shouldn't be surprised to learn that L.A. is still a living museum for fast-food outlets.

But anywhere you go, there are likely to be some special spots that you won't find from the window of the Gray Line tour bus. Flying Adventures has taken the time to find some great dining destinations that aren't always in the spotlight.

Guelaguetza

This hole-in-the-wall Mexican restaurant serves THE BEST Oaxacan mole negro sauce (a complex blend of nuts, herbs, chiles and ground seeds) in town. It's so sumptuous that even Martha Stewart couldn't visit LA with a visit to this remarkable little FA Secret Spot!

Old Place Restaurant

Hard as hell to find, but one of the reasons that God made GPS. This 100-plus-year-old hideaway hangout is a favorite of the famous, with a Hollywood legacy that once included patrons like Steve McQueen and Ally McGraw.

The Hump

Pilot-turned-culinary maven Brian Vidor (of the King Vidor gene pool) is not over The Hump. This is probably the best sushi bar in town and has seen more than its share of glitterati clientele, like aviator Harrison Ford and significant other Calista Flockhart.



Even if you haven't visited LA, this view (left) might look familiar. Disaster film producer Irwin Allen, who gave us gems like Towering Inferno and the original Poseidon Adventure, used this lake in the movie Earthquake. Thanks to the magic of the movies (and a matte painting), a large LA quake topples the Hollywood Lake dam, flooding the city below. The film was the first to use "Sensurround," a base-enhanced audio addition to the normal soundtrack, to create the feeling of being in a large earthquake. Interestingly, the 'Sensurround' presentation of Earthquake cracked the plaster ceiling of Grauman's Chinese Theatre (left), more than simulating the effects of a real earthquake.

THAT'S SHOWBIZ

Movies, music and TV have long been the lifeblood of LA This is where Charlton Heston parted the Red Sea, where Rhett Butler told Scarlett that he didn't give a damn, where Beatle George Harrison wrote a song about the "fog upon LA" from his guest bedroom on Blue Jay Way and where you're more than likely to ride an elevator with a cast member of Grey's Anatomy than anyone living in Seattle. While the entertainment industry doesn't often advertise where it's going to be next, a visitor to Los Angeles can get a craw full of Showbiz in no time.


